However, mastering various methods of handling the fiber isn't an obligatory ritual, but an element which broadens the knowledge and allows to develop one's possibilities. As a result, an individual language of artistic expression can be developed. Undertaken subjects are selected during the conversations and discourses in the studio. The student chooses the type of work for which they are responsible. We offer help in the process and try to stimulate student's progress. The diversity of attitudes requires working with particular student individually, considering their interests and current level of artistic awareness.
